


Clough Pike

Anderson Township was established in 1793, ten years before Ohio became a state. It was the only portion of Hamilton County included in the Virginia Military District, land between the Little Miami and Scioto rivers given to Virginia to pay its Revolutionary War soldiers.

The township, Clough Creek and Clough Pike were named for Richard Clough Anderson (1750-1826), principal surveyor of the district who opened his office in Louisville, Kentucky, in 1784.

The land along Clough Pike was predominately farmland until the 1950s. A photograph from the late 1890s of the Wolfer family farm shows the buildings and fields along a narrow dusty Clough Pike. Today the rebuilt farm house is an office building at 6740 Clough Pike.




Richard Clough Anderson (1750-1826) surveyor general of the Virginia Military District.

Children's Day in June 1924 at the Clough United Brethren Church. This church building at the intersection of Clough Pike at State Road remained in service until the 1960s.




The Wolfer Farm in the late 1890s. Today the rebuilt farm house is commercial property at 6740 Clough Pike.



The Clough Baptist Church, built in 1820 along Clough Creek near Bridges Road, was used by various church groups in the 1800s. It was no longer in use in this 1905 photo.



Mount Summit District 8 School, built in 1891 on Clough Pike east of Nagel Road. An earlier school operated on this site but was destroyed by fire.



Dedication day of the new Clough United Brethren Church on Clough Pike at State Road was May 8, 1921. The former church on this site had been destroyed in a fire in 1920.
