6550 CLOUGH PIKE - MILLER-LEUSER LOG HOUSE

The volunteer members of the Anderson Township Historical Society want to share with the community the Log House property on Clough Pike and their Urban Farm on Bartels Road. In January 2021, The Heritage Center property was designated as an Arboretum. An Arboretum by ArbNet's definition is a museum of woody plants which is curated in a database and updated on some kind of cycle every few years with age, size and perennials and annuals. Pollinator plants have been added as well as a topiary condition of the plants. Level I Accreditation was awarded by the ArbNet Arboretum: Accreditation Program and the Morton Arboretum on December 15, 2020.

2731 NEWTOWN ROAD - SCOTT & MICHELE BUERLEIN ()4

The Scott and Michele Beuerlein yard is a gardener's garden which features an eclectic collection of plants.

The front yard is a sunny, naturalistic space comprised of many pollinator-friendly perennials, although it is not without a handful of interesting trees and shrubs. Viburnums, lilacs, Two magnolias, two Japanese maples, a hybrid dogwood, a fringetree, and a Chinese tree lilac provide some shade and a lot of interest.

The backyard has become fairly shady under the canopy of many very cool and rare trees, including several hornbeams and small, Asian maples, a pair of bigleaf magnolias, a very rare fringetree species, a dawn redwood, three Katsuras and a Coffeetree that Scott grew from seed, and more. These trees are set amongst raised beds and paths defined by stone walls with soft, mossy paths.in between. The shady beds beneath the trees is planted with many unique and rare shadetolerant perennials. Along one side of the backyard is a sunny space with a Mediterranean look. It features grapes, raspberries, roses, herbs, and annuals for cutting.

Scott is the Manager of Botanical Garden Outreach at the Cincinnati Zoo & Botanical Garden. He also writes two columns for each issue of Horticulture Magazine, and regularly blogs on the Garden Rant blogsite. He is a sought after horticultural speaker who has given talks to green industry groups, garden clubs and other horticultural organizations all across the country. 1219 EVERSOLE RD - KAREN & STEVE MASLOWSKI

From bare dirt to a lush garden of a wide variety of bulbs, perennials, flowering shrubs and trees, berry bushes, and a raised bed garden, Steve and Karen Maslowski spent the pandemic isolation diaging holes and putting plants in them. A mature beech tree was protected during the house construction six years ago, and now overlooks nearly an acre of pollinator, vegetable, and other edible plants. Karen is a Master Gardener and wanted to be on the Garden Tour to show how to turn bare dirt into a beautiful garden within a few short years. It's still a work in progress! The Maslowski family has owned this property since 1960, when pioneer nature photographer Karl Maslowski turned the four plus acres into a studio, office, and staging area for his photography and cinematography business, which Steve continues to this day. Native plants are chosen whenever possible, to naturally attract an abundance of birds, insects, and other wildlife.

7056 GOLDENGATE DR - KATHY BOLLMER

In the last 30 years, this relatively small suburban garden has evolved from a shady haven for hostas and ferns to a sunlit oasis welcoming a colorful array of sun loving couch fronted by a pebble mosaic rug along with other unusual yard art. Off the back patio, a decorative pond with a 6-foot wide waterfall and friendly goldfish offers a quiet place to relax. As a retired librarian, Kathy's favorite garden quote comes from Cicero who said, "If you have a garden and a library, you have everything you need."

I describe our garden as modern cottage meets food forest resort. Every year I tell my husband it's nearly done and going into our 8th year owning this property he's becoming more difficult to convince of that lie. Where once

was 2 acres of grass to mow, there are now numerous garden rooms playing host to all our pollinator friends (and sometimes human friends).

The north facing white brick colonial is tucked back from the street, encapsulated with shade-loving perennials and dotted with winter interest grasses and evergreens. Follow the path to the right of the house through the arbor to the south gardens where you find the pool garden backed by a hedge of spring blooming azaleas, summer-blooming Incrediball hydrangeas, and fruit trees. Then there's the 40'x40' potager garden. I DIY'd the deer fence and built all 25 raised beds in October of 2022 and was ready to plant in May of '23. Next came the chickens. Shortly thereafter I added the path and fire pit area via multiple loads of stone in my minivan. I discovered I'm a master gardener not a master stone worker, so please watch your step. Challenges abound with beds full of woefully inherited houttuynia cordata and constant erosion problems being at the bottom of a watershed, but hopefully, there's enough eye candy to distract you from those bits. Come say hello and talk plants with me. I'm a Campbell and Kenton County Extension Master Gardener transplanted here from CA and look forward to sharing my little slice
